### THE COMMUNITY

Thousand Oaks is a family-oriented community with strong parent involvement and support. The community is rich with cultural, linguistic, and socioeconomic diversity. The community, as reflected by the parents of Thousand Oaks High School, consists of mostly active professionals with a high level of education. In a recent parent survey, we learned that 62% are college graduates with 27% of the parents having advanced degrees.

Our school community holds high expectations for all students as they matriculate through TOHS and move on to college or career. Over 94% of all graduating students have enrolled in post-secondary education, with 38% of those graduating attending community colleges, and 56% attending other four-year colleges/universities.

Of the four-year college bound students, 13% attend a California State university, 23% a University of California school, 17% out of state or private institutions, and 3% to trade tech schools or military academies.

### OUR SCHOOL

TOHS serves grades nine through twelve and has a current student population of approximately 1700 served by a teaching staff of 80. We have consistently earned regional, state, and national awards in athletics, yearbook and newspaper production, orchestra, choir, band, drum line, color guard, Academic Decathlon, Mock Trial, and dance.

Our school spirit is legendary. So much so that even the Los Angeles Times has written about our student cheering section, the Green Hole led by four seniors nominated by the previous year's graduating class. Our spirit is also found in our Lancer Band which has marched on the national stage including in the Rose and Fiesta Bowl parades, the 2016 Paris New Year's Day Champs-Elysees Parade, and the 2019 New Year's Parade in Rome.

TOHS takes pride in educating the whole child by meeting each student's academic, social-emotional, and physical needs. Most important to the quality of life at TOHS is our outstanding students. Not only are they remarkable scholars, athletes, musicians, artists, and technicians, but they are empowered members of the school community who regularly demonstrate that they are also concerned citizens of the world. They also collect money, clothing, school supplies, personal hygiene items, and blankets for relief efforts and those in need close to home and all over the world.

Over 900 students participate in athletics each year (more than 50% of our students) and an equal number enroll in one or more of our arts programs. In addition students have over 62 clubs they can join and the opportunity each year to create new ones. Each of these require substantial commitments of after-school time, whether for volunteer purposes, practice, competition, or performances. As a result, the TOHS campus is a lively place until well into the evening, on weekends, and even during holidays and breaks. The compassion and spirit of the students at TOHS serves as a source of inspiration to those associated with our school community. The 2024 California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) indicates that Thousand Oaks High School students out-perform their counterparts across Ventura County and the State of California.

### SPECIALIZED ON-CAMPUS OPPORTUNITIES

#### THE CENTER FOR ADVANCED STUDIES AND RESEARCH

Students in The Center represents the most academically rigorous college candidates on campus. The goal for students is to learn high-level research skills that will allow them to pursue their interests and find viable solutions to the world's problems. We are one of two high schools in the country where students are trained to use our on-site High-Performance Liquid Chromatography (HPLC) machines to conduct research. Students apply as freshmen and commit to a 3-year course of study including 7 Advanced Placement classes which must include the AP Capstone courses, AP Seminar and AP Research. In addition, students conduct original research approved through an Institutional Review Board (IRB) or a Scientific Review Committee (SRC) before moving forward. Recently, two students were the first in the county to win awards at the International Science and Engineering Fair as well as a Top 40 Finalist in Regeneron's Science Talent Search. Each year, 100 percent of seniors apply to and are accepted into 4-year universities and Military Academies with 96 percent attending and 4 percent choosing community college.

#### ETHOS: ENTREPRENEURSHIP ACADEMY

As one of only four entrepreneurship California Partnership Academies, ETHOS targets students of all abilities who will be inspired from the instruction provided through an entrepreneurship lens and benefit from the reduced class size within a team atmosphere. ETHOS is a school-within-a-school offering UC a-g approved courses including core English, history and math with a focus on business and entrepreneurship. In this three-year program, students take electives in Entrepreneurship, Sports and Entertainment Marketing, and Virtual Enterprise that utilize project-based learning and business models to drive curriculum. Students experience real-world marketing and networking with local and regional business owners and learn how to create and run a business. Senior year, they take their business plan, mock-ups, sales team, and management staff to the California Virtual Enterprise Trade Show competition. Students also run an on-campus printing and marketing business.

#### CAREER EDUCATION MAJORS PROGRAM

The Majors Program is an extra curricular opportunity that provides students with the experiences to understand, narrow, or expand career choices beyond high school. Students apply to one of 16 areas of interest, including our three largest: Health sciences Arts Media and Entertainment Engineering and Architecture Each fall they evaluate their year in majors at which time, they have an opportunity to explore and meet within a different major. While in the program, students complete a 30-hour internship, attend monthly guest speaker events in their field of interest, participate in field trips, job shadows, and conferences while learning to proactively plan for their future. Upon successful completion of the Majors requirements, including an annual project, students receive recognition at graduation and a certificate of completion.

#### AVID

The Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) elective is a course that prepares students for college and career readiness and success, receiving instruction that utilizes a rigorous college preparatory curriculum provided by AVID Center and aligned to the AVID College and Career Readiness. Students engage in learning tasks that incorporate strategies focused on writing, inquiry, collaboration, organization, and reading to support their academic growth. Additionally, students engage in tutor-facilitated tutorials, academic success skills, and in motivational activities centered around exploring college and career opportunities and developing their student agency.

### GRADING SYSTEM AND RANKING

Thousand Oaks High School operates on a semester calendar with an A-F grading system. One extra point is given for honors, Advanced Placement grades at any grade level. Weighted grades are based on Scholastic GPA. All Honors and AP courses use a GPA calculation of 5.0 and 4.0 for grades of A or B. Community college Dual Enrollment courses are included, if requested and approved. Dual Enrollment courses may be used to meet a graduation requirement. Grades of C and D do not earn extra weight. Thousand Oaks High School does not compute individual class rank.
