III. Student Report – Provided by Joey Spengler.

IV. Boys and Girls Club Report - Provided by Cesar Villanueva.

Average daily attendance is between 81-89 throughout the day, and
 61-77 after school, which hits the targets. Average daily attendance

- for ELOP students is 21. The One Hour Club, Ten Day Pass, Lunch Club are all included in these numbers.
- Thanksgiving Break numbers were 23 on Monday, 24 on Tuesday, and 19 on Wednesday. During these days, students built birdhouses, played sports and musical chairs, made various Thanksgiving crafts, and had a pizza party.
- The Board of Governors event is coming up, and youth will be highlighted in a singing and dancing showcase.
- The Club is planning a parent art night where parents and students can paint with an artist who will guide them in the activity. This will be either in December or January. There will also be raffle prizes and other fun included.
- Update on robotics and STEM: The Club is still working on these ventures. The space has been cleared and cleaned and a plan is being made.
- The Notter Club is doing a fundraiser to raise money for the Club and its activities; C. Villanueva will send out a link for this fundraiser.
- T. Sims asks about ELOP attendance (21). C. Villanueva notes that ELOP students get free access to the Club and free tutoring after school (students just have to qualify). He also says he's truly grateful for teachers who come after school to help tutor kids, as it makes a big difference.

■ Tim McCabe gave a presentation on Measure I updates and Redwood Campus Modernization. A Q & A session and discussion followed. Presentation is available.

VI. Committee Reports

■ DAC (District Advisory Council) – Provided by Carrie Halvorsen.

- The president of DAC gave a report on the Wellness Center, which has served students 21,000 times so far. In the middle schools, it's mostly used for social emotional services, and the focus for high school students has been on academic stress.
- The district is finding ways to implement AI in lesson plans and tutoring.
- There will be an increase in middle school fees for Outdoor School; it is currently \$250.
- TK is serving 240 students this year, which is the highest number we've had.
- School choice applications are live for next year.
- The Health and Wellness Committee is evaluating nutrition and is looking for a parent volunteer to take over this endeavor. Potential volunteers for this position should contact the committee.
- Conejo Schools Foundation has given \$60,000 dollars to teachers. Calendars should be marked for 4:30pm on April 11th, 2024, at CLU for the State of the Schools address. A formal event will take place on October 5th, 2024.
- The next meeting is at Colina Middle School on Dec 14th at 3:30pm; the focus will be on Measure I as well as a review of reports and the audit.
- TOHS Measure I update: an anatomage table has been added for 3D anatomy dissections. The future focus for TOHS is anatomy and biology, so funds are being used to bring this about.
- C. Halvorsen brought up CPR training for staff and a potential partnership with Los Robles.

 New LCAAP passed on October 10th; more information on this to come.

DELAC (District English Learning Advisory Council) – Provided by Linda Figueroa-Bertetti.

- L. Figueroa-Bertetti is absent; report submitted via email and forwarded by N. Judd.
- Dr. Dwight Rogers DEI Update, participated with the strategic plan and focused on goal # 8. "A Deeper Look".
 Improve communication with the parents and Community regarding Diversity. He asked about what 'equity' is – it is giving students what they need. He also asked questions about participation in a group in the community with the

- tools needed to achieve goals and objectives and requested volunteers from parents and provided feedback on the exercise carried out.
- Erica Ultreras, principal of Conejo Academy Elementary School, reported on the Dual Language Immersion program:
 - a) Dual Language Immersion program begins in TK, and later in 1st grade, and at the moment it ends in the 5th grade.
 - b) If any student from the district wants to come to our program and does not live in the school zone, they must apply to a lottery for seats.
 - c) This program is so complete that students have the opportunity to interact with each other in Spanish during classes.
 - d) All subjects or classes are taught in Spanish and English every day during normal school hours, and they rotate so that all children can be in them every week.
 - e) Parent participation in this program is very important so that the goal of two languages is achieved. We need parents to volunteer.
 - f) The goal of this Dual Language Immersion program is that when the children reach fifth grade, we have leaders who are multilingual, supportive, critical thinking, balanced, more sociable, capable of having a broad understanding of reading in both languages and capable of having more opportunities in the future by being able to speak both languages with complete linguistic balance.

- g) Model 50/50, balancing the amount of time in the two languages, working in small groups, practicing the two languages with their classmates.
- h) This School also has a multicultural program where every week they learn about a different country, and at the end of primary school the children will have a passport with 36 stamps from 36 different countries.
- Dena Sellers gave enrollment updates:
 - a) District enrollment in TK and K programs was provided; all the information for enrollment is on the website. Ages for participation in this program were reviewed; they accept children from 4 years old in TK and 5 years old in K.
 - b) In the TK class, there are 12 students with 1 teacher. They work in small groups with more instructions and simpler activities, and they are always taught spelling, writing, reading, and the entire academic part of numbers.
 - c) Immunizations, TK and K enrollment information, differences from traditional kindergarten, student supports, Special Education and Multilingual Learners, Magnet and Specialized Schools in the Conejo Valley School District were all discussed and reviewed.
 - d) School Choice Application: You can apply to the lottery from November 1 to January 1, 2024.
- o Dr. Ricardo Araiza gave updates:
 - a) Current Plan to achieve Compliance with any Applicable Teacher and Instructional Aide Requirements
 - b) The school district budget must be approved by DELAC

- c) All the teachers and staff who work in the school district have their credentials to teach the subjects they teach, and all have the experience they need to be educators of our children.
- d) Dr. Araiza reviewed the four goals that must be achieved in the LCAP program
- The next meeting is on January 9, 2024, from 9:00 am to noon. There will be a discussion about bullying.
